NOTICE

Sirs/Mesdames:

Please take notice that the Court, Second Division, issued a Resolution dated **25 November 2019** which reads as follows:

"G.R. No. 224184 (Manpower Resources of Asia, Inc. vs. National Labor Relations Commission [Fifth Division] and Jerson Malicse). – After a careful study of the case, the Court resolves to DENY the instant Petition for Review¹ assailing the Decision² dated January 15, 2016 and the Resolution³ dated April 14, 2016 of the Court of Appeals (CA) in CA-G.R. SP No. 140774 for failure of Manpower Resources of Asia, Inc. (petitioner) to sufficiently show that the CA committed any reversible error in upholding Jerson Malicse's (respondent) entitlement to total and permanent disability benefits.

In Kestrel Shipping Co., Inc. et al. v. Munar,⁴ the Court held that: first, "the 120 days provided under Section 20-B(3) of the Philippine Overseas Employment Administration-Standard Employment Contract is the period given to the employer to determine fitness to work and when the seafarer is deemed to be in a state of total and temporary disability;" second, "the 120 days of total and temporary disability may be extended up to a maximum of 240 days should the seafarer require further medical treatment;" and *third*, a total and temporary disability becomes permanent: (a) when so declared by the company-designated physician within 120 or 240 days, as the case may be; or (b) upon the expiration of the periods without a declaration of either fitness to work or permanent disability <u>and</u> the seafarer is still unable to resume his regular seafaring duties.⁵

In this case, the CA aptly pointed out that the 120-day and 240day periods had expired *without* any declaration of fitness to work or

permanent disability from the company-designated physician, and even after 293 days, respondent was still unable to resume his regular seafaring duties due to his shoulder injury.⁶

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Given the company-designated physician's failure to issue either a fit-to-work certification or a final disability rating within the prescribed periods, **respondent is deemed to be suffering from a total and permanent disability**⁷ and is thus entitled to the benefits corresponding thereto.⁸

WHEREFORE, the petition is **DENIED**. The Decision dated January 15, 2016 and the Resolution dated April 14, 2016 of the Court of Appeals in CA-G.R. SP No. 140774 are AFFIRMED.
